March is here and for those of you that aren't CDFM-As it's time to get serious. Certification doesn't just happen. You need to have a plan and you need to get it done. Some prefer to study and test one module at a time over several months. Others say the best road to certification is to take the Enhanced Defense Financial Management Training (EDFMT) and then test all the modules in a single day. Regardless of your approach, you need to set certification as a goal and stick to your plan until you have a certificate on your wall and CDFM-A next to your name.

Don't have a certification plan? Not sure how to start? The ASMC website has lots of helpful information -- <http://www.asmconline.org/certification/cdfm-information/testing-resources/>. There's even a plan to achieve CDFM in 8 weeks. What could be easier? How about talking to your peers? Get advice from them on how to prepare and test. Then set a goal. Set a firm date -- "I will be CDFM by XXXXX and I will be CDFM-A by XXXXX." Make your study plan and stick to it. Register for testing. Test and then be proud of your accomplishment. It really is that easy.

The National Professional Development Institute (PDI) is around the corner and offers opportunities to train and test. They even offer a workshop on *How to Become CDFM in 8 Weeks*. Use the PDI to motivate you to start your certification plan or complete your testing. Of course, there are also local training opportunities available and testing can be done anytime at a number of local locations.

Get the competitive edge. Don't get left behind. Become CDFM-A soon. There's no better time than now.

NATIONAL NEWS

ASMC Survey for Defense Financial Managers. ASMC, along with Grant Thornton LLP, is doing an online survey of defense financial managers. This Defense Financial Management community survey should take only a few minutes to complete, and asks respondents about issues facing the financial community that relate to cost management and savings. Three ASMC chapters with the highest percentage response rate to this survey will receive a cash award: *1st place – \$300, 2nd place – \$200, 3rd place – \$100.*

These awards will be based on the number of responses received per chapter divided by the total paid membership of a chapter as of **15 April 2011**. An additional **\$200** cash award will be given to the ASMC chapter with the most responses. Please be sure to enter “Alamo City Chapter” when you fill out the survey. Access the survey before **15 April 2011!** Aggregated results of this survey will be published and available on the ASMC website.

President signs bill extending FY2011 Continuing Resolution until April 8. President Obama signed the sixth FY2011 Continuing Resolution (CR) extension, which will keep the government running through **April 8**. The House passed the resolution 271-158 and the Senate passed the bill 87-13. This latest CR cuts \$6 billion from the previous CR level: \$3.5 billion by cutting or terminating 25 non-DoD programs for which no funds were requested or were recommended for termination in the president’s FY2012 budget, and \$2.6 billion by eliminating funding for more than 50 earmarked programs and projects (none from the Department of Defense). 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ORGANIZATION SPOTLIGHT

AF INTELLIGENCE, SURVEILLANCE AND RECONNAISSANCE (ISR) AGENCY

On 23 June 1948, the Air Force established the Air Force Security Group to handle special information. Over the years, the Air Force changed that special security organization to meet growing mission requirements. Further reorganizations produced the USAF Security Service (USAFSS) on 20 October 1948, the Electronic Security Command on 1 August 1979, and the Air Force Intelligence Command on 1 October 1991. The Air Intelligence Agency (AIA), a Field Operating Agency, was activated on 1 October 1993, and finally the Air Force Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance (ISR) Agency succeeded AIA on 8 June 2007. The AF ISR Agency is located at Lackland AFB, Texas.

The last name change ushered in several transformations to the organization's intelligence enterprise. In November 2007, the agency re-established a Human Intelligence (HUMINT) program for the Air Force by activating Detachment 6 at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio. Next, in February 2008 the Air Force reassigned the 480th Intelligence Wing from Air Combat Command and Eighth Air Force to the AF ISR Agency to unify the Distributed Common Ground System (DCGS) elements under one organization. Later, the growing significance of ISR led the Air Force to rename the 480th and 70th Intelligence Wings as ISR wings with subordinate ISR groups. That action established the DCGS as a global ISR weapon system, with streamlined command and control under a single point of leadership.

The AF ISR Agency also turned its National Tactical Integration (NTI) effort into a key program. Essentially, NTI made numerous ISR war-fighting capabilities available to combatant commanders, which in turn led to tremendous battlefield successes. In March 2008, the AF ISR Agency renamed Detachment 2 at Langley AFB as the Air Force Combat ISR Office. That change allowed the agency to put its arms around all ISR operational capabilities to carry out the broad duties related to the ISR operations conducted by Combat Air Forces. In late 2009 and early 2010, the agency reduced that Langley operation by moving it to Lackland to join other DCGS-related activities.

In April 2008, the AF ISR Agency restructured one of its subordinate units, the National Air and Space Intelligence Center (NASIC) at Wright-Patterson AFB, from a staff-oriented unit into a wing-level unit with 4 production-focused groups, 17 squadrons, and 3 directorates. That action strengthened the authority, accountability, and responsibility of NASIC's unit commanders. The agency also stood up the 361 ISR Group at Hurlburt Field, Fla., to make critical ISR capabilities available to Special Operations Forces.

In 2009, the agency adopted three main strategic tenets to guide its efforts: (1) bolster ISR capabilities to support joint operations; (2) develop and care for ISR professionals and their families; and (3) optimize multi-domain ISR for combatant commands and the nation. Those tenants embodied new endeavors and improvements to existing programs. One notable new effort fielded Project Liberty and its associated Production, Exploitation, and Dissemination (PED) activities. The existing endeavors included improving distributed ISR operations; strengthening ISR for space and cyber operations; and maturing ISR for special operations, HUMINT, and NTI. Later in the year, the agency surged ISR PED to support Operation ENDURING FREEDOM in Afghanistan. The organization also activated the 770 ISR Group (Provisional) at Fort Meade, Md., to support Twenty-Fourth Air Force at Lackland AFB. That group evolved into the 659 ISR Group in September 2010.

The result of all transformation actions not only gave the AF ISR Agency its multi-disciplined intelligence focus, but also turned it into a premier warfighting organization. During the year, the AF ISR Agency Commander frequently asserted that the agency was truly "all-in the fight by handling everything to the left and right of the bang." His 'bang' referred to exploding ordinance on the battlefields in foreign lands.
